The post claims that a travel company called BIG7Travel conducted a survey and declared Ukrainians the most homosexual nation in the world. It includes an image of two people wearing rainbow flags and kissing, implying this is evidence of the claim.

Fabricated claim: There is no record or publication from BIG7Travel stating that Ukrainians were named the most homosexual nation. The company is known for travel rankings (e.g., friendliest cities, best beaches), not for sexuality-based surveys.

Manipulative framing: The phrase most homosexual nation is not a legitimate sociological or statistical category. It is meant to provoke emotional or discriminatory reactions, not to inform.

Misused image: The photo shows people celebrating Pride a public event supporting LGBTQ+ rights but it does not prove any national statistic or ranking.

Disinformation goal: The post tries to ridicule or stigmatize Ukrainians by spreading a false statement, often seen in anti-Ukrainian propaganda aimed at portraying them as immoral or decadent.

Conclusion The travel company BIG7TRAVEL is not reliable for surveys especially not related to countries, as its main goal is to research about different countries. This post is a clear example of disinformation a false and emotionally charged message designed to manipulate attitudes toward Ukrainians and LGBTQ+ people. It uses a fake source, misleading visuals, and discriminatory language to create division. Before sharing such claims, its important to verify them with credible media or directly from the mentioned organizations website.

The post shows a screenshot from a Russian Telegram channel () featuring an alleged quote attributed to Donald Trump Jr. from his podcast Triggered with Don Jr.. The text claims that Trump Jr. said the U.S. should have supplied weapons to Russia instead of Ukraine, and mocks Ukraine by comparing it unfavorably to Russia, mentioning Chernobyl and radiation-resistant dogs.

No reliable evidence or source verification: There is no record or transcript confirming that Donald Trump Jr. ever made this statement in his podcast or on any other platform. Searches of the episode mentioned (Ep. 219, February 25th) do not include such remarks.

Manipulated framing: Russian state media (like the Skabeeva channel) often take out-of-context or fabricated quotes to create anti-Ukrainian or pro-Russian narratives for propaganda purposes.

Implausible statement: Suggesting that the U.S. should have supplied weapons to Russia directly contradicts U.S. foreign policy and would be politically explosive any genuine statement like this would be widely reported by credible Western media, which has not happened.

Appeal to ridicule: The text uses mocking and sarcastic language (Ukraine has Chernobyl and radiation-resistant dogs) a hallmark of propaganda aimed at demeaning a target nation rather than informing viewers.

Conclusion: This post is a piece of pro-Russian disinformation falsely portraying Donald Trump Jr. as endorsing Russia and mocking Ukraine. It likely aims to influence Russian-speaking

audiences by legitimizing anti-Ukrainian sentiment and undermining Western support for Ukraine. Always cross-check such claims with verified English-language sources or official podcast transcripts before believing or sharing them.
